

ASSISTANCE ANIMALS POLICY

Assistance Animals Policy

Purpose

The purpose of this policy is to outline Wallsend Diggers expectations regarding the admittance of assistance animals to the Licensed Premises of the properties of Wallsend Diggers, 5 Tyrrell Street, Wallsend and Wallsend Diggers Sports Club, 5 Fogo Street, Wallsend.

Scope

This policy applies to any person who enters Wallsend Diggers or Wallsend Diggers Sports Club with an animal that they class as being an assistance animal.

Board Policy

Under Standard 3.2.2 – Food Safety Practices and General Requirements, only certain animals are allowed in food premises.

The Policy of the Board of Directors is that Assistance Animals must be allowed into dining, drinking areas and other areas used by customers. They are not allowed in non-public areas, such as the kitchen. Animals must be on a lead at all times and be with their handler.

An Assistance Animal is a guide dog or other animal that is accredited to provide assistance to a person with a disability. Under section 4 of the *Disability Discrimination Act 1992* (Cth) (DDA) "disability means:

- (a) Total of partial loss of the person's bodily or mental functions:
- (b) Total or partial loss of a part of the body;
- (c) The presence in the body of organisms causing disease or illness;
- (d) The presence in the body of organisms capable of causing disease or illness;
- (e) The malfunction, malformation or disfigurement of a part of the person's body;
- (f) A disorder or malfunction that results in the person learning differently from a person without the disorder or malfunction; or
- (g) A disorder, illness or disease that affects a person's thought processes, perception of reality, emotions or judgment or that results in disturbed behaviour;

And includes a disability that:

- (h) Presently exists;
- (i) Previously existed but no longer exists;
- (j) May exist in the future (including because of a genetic predisposition to that disability); or
- (k) Is imputed to a person.

Accreditation

Accreditation must be cited by the Staff or Management before any person enters the Licensed Premises with what they claim to be an assistance animal.

There are number of Accreditations.

Pet Dogs/Animals

Pet Dogs/Animals are not allowed into the Licensed Premises at all.



People who are blind or vision impaired can enter any public place and use any form of public transport with their Guide Dog in N.S.W., other states and territories. This includes restaurants, hotels, motels, bises, trains, taxis and planes. Preventing a person with a Guide Dog from entering public places or vehicles, or imposing fees for permitting them into public places, is a criminal offence. Fines apply to those who are found in breach of the law. Discrimination against Guide Dog handlers is also prohibited by antidiscrimination legislation in all states and territories.
